
Errata: How Grove

Unfortunately several errors crept into the paper on How Grove, published in the last number of *Mining History* (15.2). They are as follows:

Parts of the text at the base of page 4 have been placed wrongly: The last line of the first column and the following first seven lines of the second column should be removed from here and placed after the last word on the page, to read:

‘Smith Grove did well between 1758 and 1767 when annual output was mostly around 1000 dishes, but reaching two peaks of over 3000 in 1761 and 1764. In contrast, Royse Grove was a small mine, which was sold to Sam Smith in 1761, from which date no mining took place until the mine was developed by Joseph Whittle from 1776. Needham Grove produced small amounts of ore in most years, except in 1760 when this exceeded 1000 dishes of grove ore.’

Plate 1. The ruined coe before excavation.

Plate 6. The site after excavation, illustrating the restricted sloping site of the north-eastern buddling complex.

Plate 7. The buddling complex during excavation.

Plate 10. The sandstone flags underneath the site of the grate launder.

Plate 11. The circular buddle grate with sandstone flags behind.

Plate 12. The decayed planks of the shovelling floor adjacent to the circular buddle grate.

Plate 14. Disused horse-drawn crusher described as at “New Cross Mine”; this is almost certainly the same crusher as illustrated in Plate 13 at Windy Mine on Moss Rake. The pushers may be members of the Derbyshire Pennine Club. (H.M. Parker: Derbyshire Pennine Club Colln).

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
